INTRODUCTION

COVID-19 pandemic has devastated socio-economic conditions across the world. Millions of people across the world have suffered due to COVID-19 so far and many millions are likely to suffer in the coming days. The unprecedented emergency has halted livelihood activities. In order to deal with the pandemic, vaccination is the most efficient way to strengthen your immune system by training it to recognize and fight against the specific virus. On the occasion of "Azaadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav", the 75th Independence Day, 9 NSS volunteers of Ram Lal Anand College conducted a survey on the covid-19 vaccination. It was the way to go for the principal Professor Dr. Rakesh Kumar Gupta to be mindful of the general public about the covid-19 vaccination and its safeguards. He directed the NSS volunteers about their moral responsibilities towards society. Dr. Rita Jain (Program Officer of NSS) and Captain Dr. Sanjay Kumar Sharma (Associate NCC Officer) encouraged NSS volunteers and furthermore participated in the campaign by showing and pasting informative posters and distributing masks.























COVID-19 VACCINATION DRIVE: A SURVEY OF ADOPTED VILLAGE OF RAM LAL ANAND COLLEGE

OBJECTIVE

- To survey about the covid-19 vaccination drive started by the Government of India and its safeguards.
- To distribute masks and aware people by displaying informative posters.

METHODOLOGY

On the occasion of Azaadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav the 75th Independence Day, 9 NSS volunteers of Ram Lal Anand College conducted a survey on the covid-19 vaccination. Informative posters were displayed and a survey was conducted through google forms. Precautions were taken by wearing masks and gloves and using sanitizer by each volunteer.

NSS Volunteers showed the **posters** to the local people and pasted them as well at visible points to make them aware of the social distancing and current covid-19 vaccination drive with the help of filmy dialogues. This ensured that the posters created awareness as well as attracted the general public too.

Apart from this, a total of 200 **masks** were distributed among the needful ones present in the slums and nearby areas. In order to identify the situation at the local level, a survey was conducted with the help of **Google Forms** wherein the volunteers interacted with local people and asked them the relevant questions and requested the public to get vaccinated. They also motivated villagers to wear masks.

We believe in rural parts, it is important to first make communities aware about what vaccination is and its purpose. The lack of such rudimentary information makes people vulnerable to rumours and misinformation. Seeing the situation all around and the rumours and doubts which are among the villagers related to the Covid-19 vaccine, the NSS unit of Ram Lal Anand College organised a survey to the JJ colony, a resettlement colony in New Delhi.

STUDY AREA

JJ Colony, Shastri Market, South Moti Bagh, New Delhi, Delhi 110021.

NSS volunteers reached the location at 1 PM and targeted the local people to conduct the survey and spread awareness about the COVID-19 vaccination.

DEMOGRAPHIC DETAILS


AGE -

The below-mentioned graph depicts that a total of 83 key informants were sampled for the study. All sampled populations were from different age groups. Most (Almost 9.6%) of them fell in the age group of 43-45 years.




GENDER-

The pie chart depicts that out of the total people surveyed, 54 were males i.e. 65.1% and 29 were females i.e. 34.9%.




SURVEY ANALYSIS

9 NSS volunteers interviewed local people and gathered 83 responses.




COVID-19 STATUS



As per the responses gathered, more than 95% of the people did not have covid at all. 2-3% of people suffered from covid and 2% were not sure whether they had covid or just normal cold.

Out of the 2-3% of people who had covid, most of them preferred being home quarantined and only a few of the people were admitted to the hospital.

Many of them faced financial issues due to lack of employment and were also afraid to go to the hospitals seeing the situation of the covid wards.




VACCINATION STATUS


According to the responses, 48 i.e. 57.8% of the local people did not get vaccinated at all. 28 i.e. 33.7% of people got their first vaccination dose, and only 11 i.e. 13.3% of the people got the second dose which is even lower. Even after ample facilities provided by the government, people were afraid of getting the vaccine dose. A large number of people did not get vaccinated which was very disappointing.




Volunteers awared people and tried to solve their misunderstandings on the rumors being spread across on vaccines.




Around 50% of them had never tried cowin app and 30% of them did not know how to use it. A lower percentage of 16-17 knew how to use the app. Lack of knowledge among the people was probably a major issue found. Volunteers taught the local people to use the app and requested them to get their registration done as soon as possible.

As Covishield doses were easily available than covaxin, most of the people got covidshield (24%), and 18-19% of the people got covaxin whereas 56% of them didn't get vaccinated at all.



Sarvodhya Vidhyalaya, Dispensary DGD Motibagh, Charak Palika hospital were some of the nearest vaccination centres as told by the people during the survey.


Through the survey, it was found that very few people got vaccinated by registering on Cowin app. Also, around 54.3% got vaccinated in some other way.



As per the interactions, majority of people got themselves vaccinated during months of June-July. A reason for this was the easy availability of vaccine doses at that time, as stated by the maximum people there. Through the survey, it was found that there are many reasons due to which people did not get the vaccine. A major issue of approximately 24% of people was that the vaccine doses were not readily available whereas on the other hand, many of them did not know how to get themselves register on Cowin app in order to get the vaccine. Far off, long queues, costly doses were some of the other reasons given.

CONCLUSION

Covid-19 has taken a surge in India since lockdown was lifted. The precautionary measures and vaccination is the only way to deal the virus. After conducting the surveys, we observed that half the people did not have proper awareness about the COVID-19 vaccine and were not fully prepared to deal with this pandemic.

A total of 83 responses were collected where we observed that those who were affected by the virus wanted to get proper treatment but couldn't get due to the financial problems and lack of employment. Some people added that during tough times, their family members and friends provided a huge amount of support to them, and hence could get through the difficult phases of lockdown. Due to lack of awareness, many of them were not able to get themselves vaccinated.
